


Five Stages of Grief


Confidence

What are the key stressors in end-of-life care?

Key Results

Experience = Self Confidence

Self Confidence != Confidence

Consistency is key – but we lack it.

It's good to talk sometimes, about some things.

We acknowledge deficits in education / confidence, but it hasn't changed.
